CLASS DESCRIPTIONS

101 (3 sessions) **Den Leader (& assistant) Training** (take EITHER 101 or 401)  – Learn about running a den meeting with the Adventure program. Learn about Cub advancement, behavior issues, and how to have fun with Cub Scouts.

102 (3 sessions) **Cubmaster (& assistant) Training** – Learn about your role in the Pack as a Cubmaster, Assistant Cubmaster, or prospective Cubmaster. This class shows what it takes to be a Cubmaster, including roles of the Cubmaster and Assistant Cubmaster, the Cub Scout advancement program, the importance of Pack program planning, planning a Pack meeting, the Cubmaster Award, and how to succeed as a Cubmaster. 


103 (3 sessions) **Den Chief Training** (for YOUTH)  – One of the positions of responsibility a Scout can hold is den chief. This course is for current and future den chiefs. They will learn their duties in the Cub Scout program while learning the leadership, organization, and problem-solving skills needed for success.


104 (3 sessions) **New Syllabus! BALOO**  (Plus Nov 1-2 overnight & additional charge, Outdoors) – Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation: Learn what it takes to safely organize a fun Pack or Den campout. At least one leader on any Pack (or Den) overnight must have taken this class. Part of this class will be outdoors. This training includes an overnight experience. The first three hours will be at Program & Training Conference, the balance will be Friday evening through Saturday. There is an addition cost of \$15 for BALOO.


105 (6 sessions) **Scoutmaster (& assistant) Training**  – This leader-specific training is for Scoutmasters, Assistant Scoutmasters, and interested parents. Learn how a 'Scout-led' troop operates. Have confidence managing the Scoutmaster role. Learn about the resources available to ensure success. (Scoutmasters and assistants will also need Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills to recharter.)

106 (4 sessions) **Venturing Advisor (& associate) Training**  – Learn about your role as a guide to young adults running a Crew. This is the position-specific training for all Crew Advisors and Associate Advisors. Appropriate for Crew Committee Members and parents as well.


107 (2 sessions) **Crew Committee Training**  – This leader-specific training is for everyone on the Crew committee and parents (and is useful for Advisors and associates). It provides an overview of all the positions of the committee and how they contribute to the success of a Crew.


108 (5 sessions) **Sea Scout Training** – Sea Scout Adult Leader Basic Training is the first 


step in training for all Sea Scout leaders focusing on the skills and attributes necessary to be an effective advisor in the Ship's deliverance of service to youth in your specific geographic location. It is intended primarily to enhance individual knowledge of and connectivity with the strategic plan, program and resources, while emphasizing personal skills necessary for the development of youth in the Sea Scout program.



109 (3 sessions) **Unit Commissioner Training**  – Learn why we have commissioners, the basics to be effective, top priorities, and helping the unit succeed in delivering a quality Scouting program.


110 (6 sessions) **Wilderness and Remote First Aid**     (Plus Nov 2 ALL day & additional charge, Outdoors) – This 16-hour hands-on training is designed to prepare you to systematically deal with any accident or first aid emergency when you and your group are more than one hour away from Emergency Medical Services. The final part of this training will be a FULL Saturday. Youth must be at least 14 years old. Come prepared to spend most of the day outdoors in fall weather. Bring a day pack with the ten essentials and a blue foam pad. To complete the class and be certified you need current CPR certification. The cost of the Program & Training Conference with this class is \$75 (youth and early signup discounts do not apply).


111 (3 sessions) **FUNDamentals of Training**  – This class introduces teaching techniques and skills that can be used when working with the youth in a unit or with adults. It is designed to help all Scouters, both youth and adult, to be more effective instructors. This is the first part of the Train-The-Trainer continuum (T3, or T-Cubed) in the Scouts of America.


112 (2 sessions) **Merit Badge Counselor Training**  – Merit badges are a cornerstone of Advancement. Over the years, there have been many changes in how merit badges are handled. Learn the latest the National has to say on being an outstanding Merit Badge Counselor.




113 (1 session) **Planning an Engaging Cub Scout Program**  – Come and learn how to plan and budget a compelling and engaging year of Cub Scouting.




114 (1 session) **Revised! Getting Started with Scoutbook for Packs**   (for beginners) – Scoutbook is the BSA's electronic advancement platform with calendar and messaging capabilities and so much more. This class is perfect for those who have never used Scoutbook or have just begun.





115 (1 session) **New! Cub Scout Adventures - Lessons Learned**  – Overview of the Cub Scout Adventures, fun tips, lessons learned - more than just a leader guide!


116 (1 session) **Make it Move!** – Have fun tinkering with Rube-Goldberg machines and Robotics* Be the den leader all the kids remember! *Satisfies Nova requirement. 


117 (2 sessions) **Dutch Oven Cooking Basics** (Outdoors) –  Learn the basics required to cook with a Dutch Oven. Get recipes and resources and even sample some cooking. Class will be held outdoors.

118 (2 sessions) **Backpacking**    – Learn the basics of backpacking. Topics include gear, clothing, food, Outdoor Ethics (Leave No Trace), gender-specific tips, and other useful information.

119 (2 sessions) **Backpacking & Camping for Women**    – This is an information sharing session on the ins and outs of backpacking and camping for women. All ages & experience levels are welcome. Learn from experienced female backpackers. The more ideas, the better.

120 (2 sessions) **Cooking & Menus in the Back & Frontcountry**     – Create balanced menus and inexpensive backcountry meals. Learn to dehydrate food, determine quantities, repackage, store, and prepare. Sample menus will be presented for weekend and week-long outings.



121 (1 session) **The Troop's New Member Coordinator**  – More youth drop out in the first 3 months after joining a troop than at any other time. The New Member Coordinator is another Scout parent who helps keep new Scouts and their families informed about what is happening in the troop and makes them feel welcome, not just right after the new Scout joins but for as long as they are needed. This person may feel more approachable and less intimidating to new parents than uniformed leaders might.

122 (1 session) **Growing Scouts into Leaders**  – Just as we don't teach swimming by throwing a Scout off the end of the pier, but by building the skills needed; we have to teach leadership skills. Learn how to set the Scouts up for success by coaching and mentoring them in their leadership roles.

124 (5 sessions) **Training the Youth Leadership of the Troop**   (for Adults and Youth) – This instructional ILST (Introduction to Leadership Skills for Troops) is designed to help units put on the training for themselves. Participants will learn leadership skills and get ideas on how to teach them from some of the very best instructors in the council – our NYLT staff. For the troop to get the most out of this training, it should be attended by the youth and adult who will be doing and overseeing training in the troop.

125 (1 session) **First Aid I - Making First Aid REAL** –

Let's face it, First Aid merit badge training mostly focuses on simple skills like how to splint an arm or put on moleskin. Come learn techniques you can use to take your Scouts to a new level by actually teaching them how to handle emergencies. Leave with an outline, scenario descriptions, and supporting materials you can use to plan and conduct a First Aid 'disaster training' that will become your Scouts' favorite event. Attendees are encouraged to take 225 (Bloody First Aid Disasters Your Scouts will Love).

126 (2 sessions) **Project Management Training** (for Venturing YOUTH) –

Learn how to plan and safely execute a project that achieves your objectives and gets the job done on time and in budget. This is a required class for the Pathfinder Award.

127 (1 session) **Time Management and Goal Setting** (for Venturing YOUTH) –

Finding a successful time management strategy depends on each individual's personal ability to self-motivate and level of self-discipline. This course introduces established methods for improving a youth's ability to effectively manage a daily timeline in his or her life. This is a required class for the Discovery Award.

128 (4 sessions) **ILSC Train the Trainer** (for Venturing YOUTH) –

This train the trainer class will prepare Venturing Youth Leaders to train ILSC within their Crews. We will review the ILSC syllabus, discuss appropriate and original ways to present the material and brainstorm activities to make the ILSC training a fun and engaging activity. Participation in this class will meet the ILSC requirements.

129 (1 session) **LGBTQ Resources for Leaders** –

Learn about resources available to Scout Leaders serving LGTBQ youth and their families. Includes a discussion of recent BSA policy changes.

130 (2 sessions) **Serving Scouts with Special Needs** –

This course will provide Commissioners and unit leaders with tips and ideas that promote inclusion of Scouts with disabilities, medical conditions, and aggressive or inattentive behaviors. Learn techniques on how to involve and manage youth to get better cooperation for smooth-running meetings.

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213 (1 session) **Building a Successful Cub Scout Recruitment Plan** –

Learn all about today's parents, "the Millennials," and how Scouting can fit into their family goals. Explore the use of social media and experience-oriented Scouting events to give an unparalleled experience to new and current Cub Scout families.

214 (1 session) **Revised! Digging Deeper into Scoutbook for Packs** (assumes you already use Scoutbook) –

Ready to get deeper into Scoutbook? Increase your knowledge of this powerful tool to help your Pack run successfully. This class is for leaders who took "Getting Started" or have at least a beginner's level of mastery.

215 (1 session) **Map & Compass Essentials** –

(Outdoors) – Learn some great tricks and techniques for teaching map and compass skills to your Scouts in your Pack or Troop. Through fun games and hands-on activities, they'll master these essential skills. Please bring your own compass. Class will be held outdoors.

216 (1 session) **Revised! Beginner Knots** (for the novice) –

Learn the basics of knot tying that every camper should know, whether you are a Cub Scout leader or a Scouts BSA leader.

221 (1 session) **Ham Radio and Scouting** (JOTA - Jamboree on the Air) –

319 (1 session) Using Arduino Kits for Electronic & Programming MB –  Arduino (see <http://www.arduino.cc>) is an open-source electronics platform based on easy-to-use low cost hardware and software. Arduino boards can read inputs - light on a sensor, a finger on a button, or a Twitter message - and turn it into an output - activating a motor, turning on an LED, publishing something online. It's an outstanding platform for learning about both electronics and programming. This session focusses on how to use Arduino at the core of teaching the Programming and Electronics merit badges, and focuses on available resources that Leaders with an interest in these subjects can use to effectively deliver these merit badges.

321 (1 session) Introduction to Shooting Sports – Learn about    rifle, shotgun, muzzleloading, archery, and pistol shooting opportunities at the unit, district, and council levels, as well as certification and training opportunities for volunteers.

322 (1 session) Revised! Digging Deeper into Scoutbook for Troops   (assumes you already use Scoutbook) – Ready to get deeper into Scoutbook? Increase your knowledge of this powerful tool to help your Pack run successfully. This class is for leaders who took "Getting Started" or have at least a beginner's level of mastery.






323 (1 session) Starting a New Crew    – Curious about Venturing – the Scouting program for youth ages 14-20? Would you like to learn how easy it is to start a Venturing Crew? Maybe you have already started a Crew and need some pointers on what does and what doesn't work? Come check out this class and learn about Venturing - the Scouting program that opens the doors of limitless possibilities to all of our youth over 14 years old.



325 (1 session) What OA Can Do for Your Troop   – The Order of the Arrow provides a venue for your Scouts to further practice their leadership skills and to learn about the exciting activities from members of other troops. When they bring this practice and knowledge back to your troop, you will benefit from improved youth leadership and new program ideas to excite your scouts.


326 (1 session) Running a Successful Crew Meeting   (for Venturing YOUTH) – Learn about balancing business with fun at your meetings, and get ideas for opening ceremonies and activities.

327 (1 session) Conflict Management   (for Venturing YOUTH) – Even the most effective communicators experience conflict. This class will examine some common pitfalls, and practice ways to avoid them.


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329 (1 session) New! Invisible Backpack - What Youth Bring That You Might Not Know About      – Learn what youth are carrying in their daily lives and how you can identify problems to address, and the resources available to assist.


330 (1 session) New! LDS Cub Scout Families in 2020   – What can Latter-day Saints families expect as they and their sons transition to a traditional pack in 2020? What are the opportunities and challenges of starting a new pack?



401 (3 sessions) Den Leader (& assistant) Training  (take EITHER 101 or 401) – REPEAT of Class 101. Learn about running a den meeting with the Adventure program. Learn about Cub advancement, behavior issues, and how to have fun with Cub Scouts.

402 (3 sessions) Pack Committee Training  – Make sure your Pack thrives with a strong Pack Committee! Objectives include defining the role of the Pack committee, makeup and functions of the Pack committee, recruiting leadership and volunteers, record keeping, and the Pack planning process.



403 (2 sessions) Chartered Organization Leaders & Representatives Training     – This class helps chartered organization leaders (Institution Heads) and chartered organization representatives explore ways to make their Scouting programs more effective. It explains the chartered organization concept and allows participants to provide ideas for integrating Scouting with existing youth programs.



404 (3 sessions) Troop Committee Training PLUS  – This leader-specific training is for everyone on the Troop committee and parents (and is useful for Scoutmasters and assistants). It provides an overview of all the positions of the committee and how they contribute to the success of a Troop. The PLUS? Tips on how you can take this training back to your unit as a team-building training for YOUR committee.


407 (2 sessions) Games, Games, & More Games!   – Learn about, and play, some themed games! Includes gathering games, games that pair well with den meeting achievements, and quiet games that the Scouts can play while they're waiting on field trips.


409 (2 sessions) District Commissioner (and ADC) Training  – Learn to be a more effective District Commissioner or Assistant District Commissioner, supporting Unit Commissioners as they help their units deliver a quality Scouting program.


411 (2 sessions) Outdoor Ethics Orientation  – Qualifies participants to facilitate outdoor ethics activities required for their Scouts and Scouters to earn the Outdoor Ethics Awareness Award. Topics include the Outdoor Code, principles of Leave No Trace and Tread Lightly!, the Land Ethic, and the Outdoor Ethics Awareness and Action Awards program.


412 (1 session) Making Cub Scouts Welcome   – The New Member Coordinator is another Cub Scout parent who helps keep new families informed about what is happening in the den and pack, and feels more approachable and less intimidating to new parents than a uniformed leader might, not just right after new Cub Scout join, but for as long as they are needed.




413 (1 session) Girls in Cub Scouts   – Come learn the latest information on Family Scouting from the national office and how Packs are making this exciting new program work.

414 (1 session) Cyber Chip for all Ages  – Our young Scouts have never known life without computers or the Internet, so it is critical that they know how to safely navigate the Web. The Cyber Chip program builds on BSA's commitment to youth protection. Learn how your unit can get the most out of this program to keep kids safe.




415 (1 session) Mad Scientist!  – Out of your league with science and technology? Learn how to make science fun with some simple experiments.


416 (1 session) Revised! Advanced Knots  (for the expert) – If you've already mastered your camping knots, come have fun learning some possibly not so practical, but definitely fun knots.


417 (2 sessions) Advanced Dutch Oven Cooking  (Outdoors) – You've mastered chili and cornbread. Your chocolate cake with cherries is cooked, not burned. If you're ready for more complex recipes, this is the class for you. Class will be held outdoors.


418 (2 sessions) Patrol Cooking    (Outdoors) – Tired of seeing Scouts breaking out the 'top ramen' for dinner? Come learn about menu ideas, cooking without utensils, and other ideas to enhance your unit's cooking skills.

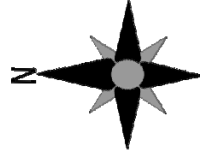
MAP AND DIRECTIONS

 The college is on the right.



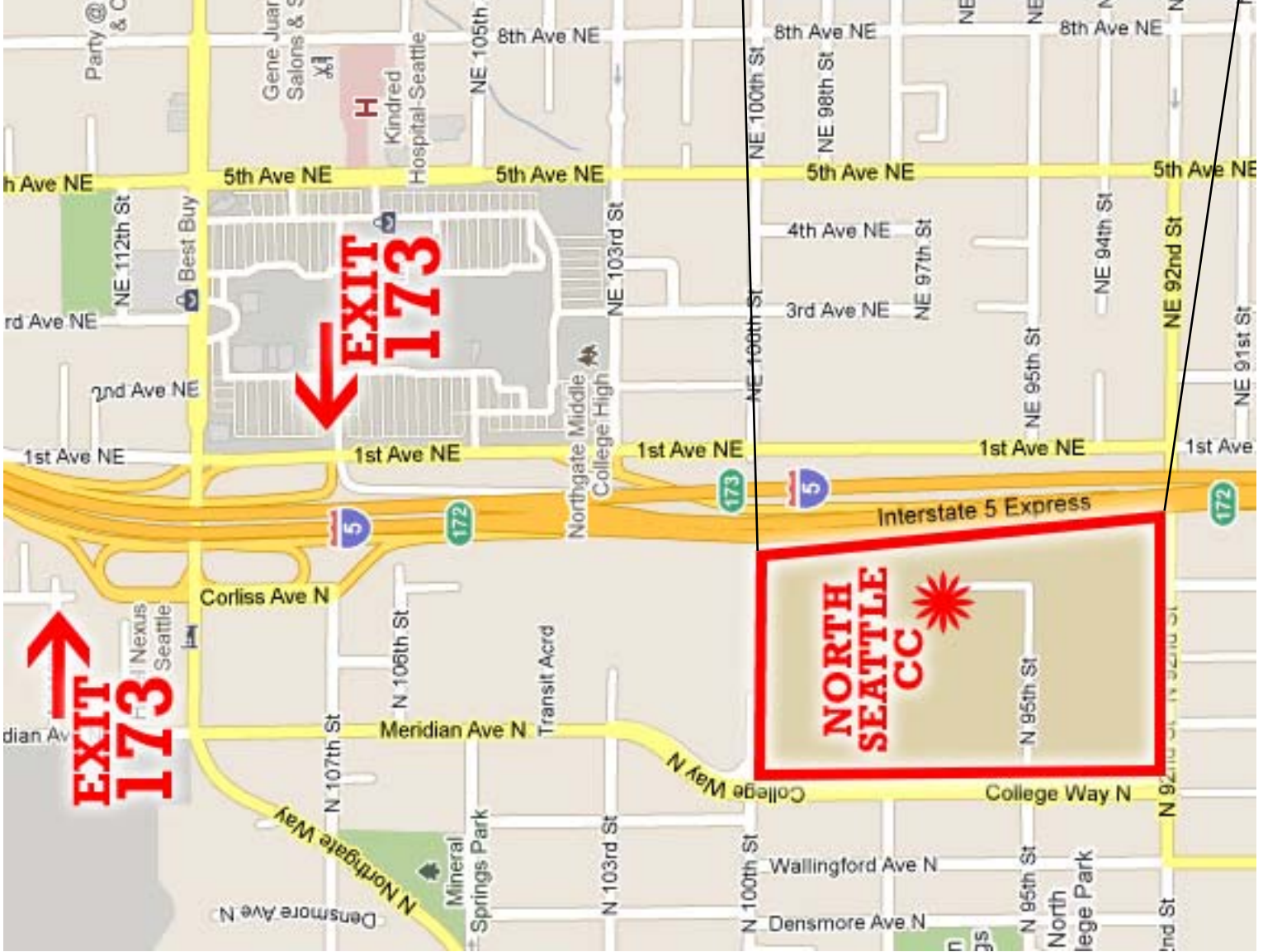
GPS:

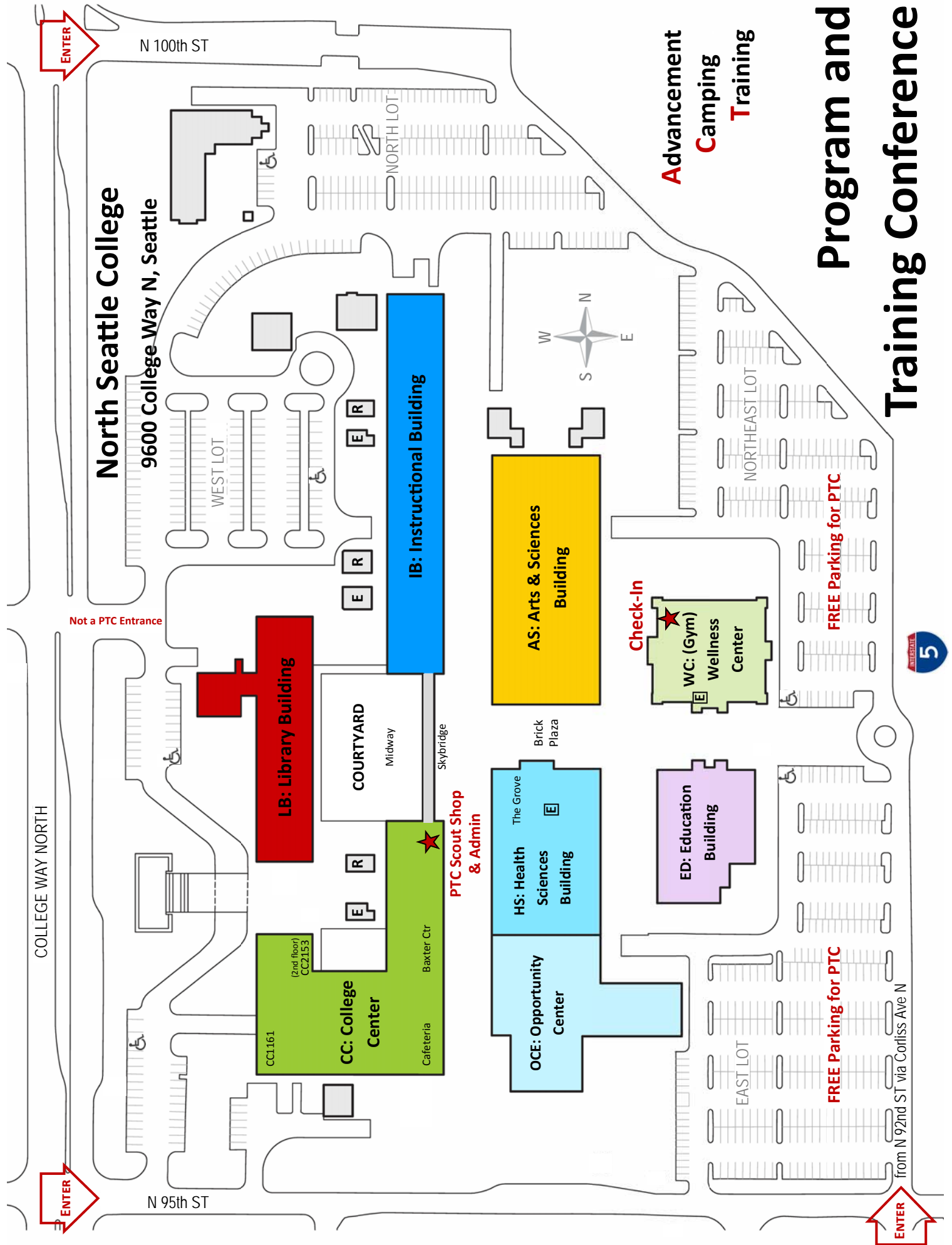
9600 College Way N, Seattle will take you to the "front" of Campus, PARKING is in the "back."
