

### Planning Great Campouts for Your Pack

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### Why Take Cub Scouts Camping?

- Contributes to good health.
- Helps develop self-reliance and resourcefulness.
- Enhances spiritual growth.
- Contributes to social development.
- Camping is an experience in citizenship training.
- Helps earn JTE status.
- Introduction to knowledge and skills to be used as a Scout.



## **Before You Go**





#### • Leadership:

- Two registered adult (21+) leaders required at all times.
- At least one registered <u>female</u> adult leader required for events involving girls.

#### • Training:

- Youth Protection Training required for all leaders.
- BALOO training required for <u>one</u> campout leader.
- Safe Swim Defense required for aquatics.
- Safety Afloat required for boating.
- Hazardous Weather Training recommended.





#### Tent Accommodations:

- Separate tenting arrangements must be provided for male and female adults as well as for male and female youth.
- Youth sharing tents should be no more than two years apart in age.
- In Cub Scouting, parents and guardians may share a tent with their family.
- In all other programs, youth and adults tent separately.
- Spouses may share tents.





#### Lodging/Cabin Accommodations:

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- Whenever possible, separate cabins or lodging should be provided for male and female adults as well as for male and female youth. Where separate accommodations cannot be provided due to group size or limited availability, modifications may be made. Where completely separate accommodations are not available, additional supervision is required.
- If adults and youth of the same gender occupy single-room accommodations, there must be a minimum of two adults and four youth, with all adults being Youth Protection trained.
- Physical separation by other means, including temporary barriers or space, should be used only when no other arrangements are possible.







#### Restrooms:

 Separate shower and latrine facilities should be provided for male and female adults as well as for male and female youth. If separate facilities are not available, separate times should be scheduled and posted.

#### • Vehicle Insurance:

WA State minimums required for transporting scouts, more is recommended.

#### • Location:

- Cub Scout campsites <u>must</u> be council approved.

- Two to six people is good.
- Shared experience and responsibility.
- Divide the work- buying food, transporting gear, making reservations, etc.
- Start meeting early, campouts take time to plan and execute.

#### Get RSVP's

- Roster of who is going, adults and youth.
- Better planning for food, accommodations.



- Ranger On-Site.










# Equipment





#### Personal Gear:

- Weather Appropriate Clothing, Hat, Rain Gear, Waterproof Bags.
- Tent, Sleeping Bag, Air Mattress.
- Headlight w/ Batteries, Lantern, Flashlight.
- Camp Chairs.
- Mess Kit, Personal Cooking Gear (if needed).
- Personal First Aid Kit, Medicines.
- Knife, Whistle, Matches/Lighter.
- Tool Kit or Multi-Tool.
- Water Bottle, Canteen.
- Compass and Maps (if needed).





- Pack Kitchen Gear:
  - Stove(s) with griddles, extra propane.
  - Coolers.

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- Cooking Utensils:
  - Knives, Spatulas, Forks, Spoons, Tongs, Pot Holders, Cutting Boards, measuring cups/spoons.

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- Mixing Bowls, Serving Dishes.
- Pots and Pans of Various Sizes.
- Wash Basins (3), Dish Soap, Sponges.
- Paper Towels, Cleaning Product, Garbage Bags.
- Aluminum Foil, Food Storage Bags.
- Dutch Oven, S'more Sticks.

#### General Pack Gear:

- Axe, Shovel, Water Bucket.
- Water Storage Containers.
- Pop-Up Canopy, Tarp or Dining Fly.
- Folding Table
- Lanterns with Fuel and Mantles.
- <u>Large</u> First-Aid Kit (group size).
  - EpiPen? Other Medications?
- Wagon, Cart.
- Folding Tables, Chairs.

Rope, Clothesline.

- Flags?

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# **Feeding Everyone**





#### • Leave Food up to Individuals:

- Easiest for the Camping Committee, less potential waste.
- Coordinating cooking and clean up can be difficult.
- May be a barrier to camping for some people.

#### • Feed Everyone as a Group:

- Cooking and cleaning easier with communal meals.
- Promotes group unity and sharing of responsibility.
- Hard to cater to all individual tastes.
- Don't forget about food allergies!





#### Having a good RSVP helps with meal planning.


- Know how much food to plan for each meal, less waste.
- Keep track of food allergies.

#### Shop for food as a group.

<u>Don't leave it up to one person.</u>

#### Friday night dinner?

- Have people eat dinner before arriving.
- Have something pre-cooked or very easy to cook.
  - Set-up always takes longer than expected.
  - People may come in at different times.



## **Campout Activities**





#### Plan a Full Schedule.

- May need to keep the boys occupied the whole weekend.
- Be weather-flexible.
  - Have multiple activity options for rain or shine.
- Be Prepared to Go Off-Schedule.
  - Unstructured time outdoors is great for boys, especially "city kids".
  - Boys love to run around and explore in the woods.

#### • Think "Cub Resident Camp" for Ideas





#### Advancement:

- Consult your handbooks, there are multiple campout related Adventure Requirements and Electives for all Cub levels.
- Have awards on hand, if possible.
- Hold an awards ceremony at the evening campfire.
- Use the Internet / Books for Activity Ideas:
  - Do your research <u>before</u> you go.
  - Some activities require special materials that need to be ordered ahead of time.





#### Campout Activities:

- Hiking.
- Plant and Tree Identification.
- Leather Craft and Paracord Projects.
- Whittling Chip:
  - Have cards on hand to present.
- Cooking / Meal Preparation (advancement!)
- Board and Card Games.
- Fishing (license not required for kids).
- Plan Skits and Songs for Campfire or Other Events.
- Swimming or Boating (training required).





#### Activities, Cont.:

- Polar-Bear Plunge.
- Orienteering (bring compasses and maps).
- Outdoor Cooking.
- Campfires:

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- S'mores, Dutch Oven.
- Camp Service Project.
- Scout's Own Service.
  - Sunday Morning before you leave.

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## **End of the Campout**





#### What To Do When Leaving Camp:

- Clean up!

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- Police campsite for any litter.
- Clean bathrooms and sweep cabins.
- Haul out all garbage.
- Check out of camp with the Ranger.
- Split up leftover food.
- Dump your garbage (potentially not on-site).
- Return Pack gear to storage.
  - Be sure to dry things out if wet!

#### Leave Things <u>Better</u> Than When You Arrived!

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#### • Have a Follow-Up Committee Meeting:

- What went well, what could be improved?
- New ideas while they are fresh in people's minds?
- Go over campout expenses.
  - Reimbursements due?
- Choose a Campout Committee for next time!
