Full Day Badges:

***Nuclear Science brought to you by Dr. Arden Dougan- fear not, she is FUN and this is cool!**

Prerequisite: 2 B please bring the isotope model with you.

(can be made with tooth picks and gumdrops etc...)

Overview: Nuclear science gives us a simple explanation of the natural world. The ultimate goal of nuclear science is to find out if there is one fundamental rule that explains how matter and forces interact. Earning the Nuclear Science merit badge is a chance for Scouts to learn about this exciting field at the cutting edge of science today.

Overview: In earning the Insect Study merit badge, Scouts will glance into the strange and fascinating world of the insect. There, they will meet tiny creatures with tremendous strength and speed, see insects that undergo startling changes in habits and form as they grow, and learn how insects see, hear, taste, smell, and feel the world around them.

Overview: Realize the benefits of diversity, equity, inclusion, and ethical leadership with the Citizenship in Society Merit Badge. Scouts will research any individual who has demonstrated positive leadership while making an ethical decision, explain what options the leader had when faced with a problem, why they believe they chose their final course of action, and the outcome of the leader's decision.

Overview: Beyond capturing family memories, photography offers a chance to be creative. Many photographers use photography to express their creativity, using lighting, composition, depth, color, and content to make their photographs into more than snapshots. Good photographs tell us about a person, a news event, a product, a place, a scientific breakthrough, an endangered animal, or a time in history.

It’s being brought to you by A collector of over 60 years, Ed Prophet and his side kick Janis Tipton-King. You will receive a basic album and a ton of stamps to get you started or to add to your collection. Make any sort of collection- by art, by country, by nature, by planes, by sports etc...

Overview: The world’s most popular hobby, stamp collecting is enjoyed by millions throughout the world. Through this hobby, you can experience history: postage stamps are like tiny windows that introduce the people of the world to the country’s leaders, customs, history, products, and environment.

Skill Sessions:

These are NOT badges but trail to first class skill sessions

Knots and Lashing for trail to first class and beyond taught by Camp Bonaparte’s Alan Kelso forester and all-round knotty guy.

Go get your bowline, sheep shank, lark’s head, clove hitch, tautline hitch, sheet bend, timber hitch, half hitches all squared (knot) away with Alan. Learn how to make most anything from bridge to towers and from tables to swing sets with lashing basics.

This is offered in the morning and repeats in the afternoon so you have 2 chances to up your knot game.

First Aid skills for trail to first class taught by first aid/CPR instructor, Ed Prophet.

Do you really know how to bandage someone who has injured themselves or are you more of a mummy wrapping sort of person? Can you calmly handle a heart attack? Bleeding? An eye injury? Transport someone without hurting yourself? All the tenderfoot, second and first class ranks have important first aid skills to learn, demonstrate and remember. Come and learn them the right way and be prepared to rescue someone some day.

Basic Directions

From the Coulee Area: Head over Hwy 155 and then north on 97. OR if it is snowy / icy you can use the low route which is Hwy 17 and then north on Hwy 97. The church is close to the border on your left.

From the Methow Take Hwy 20 east to Hwy 97 and then north through most of Oroville and the church is on your left.

From the south: Take Hwy 97 north, past most of Oroville and the church is on your left.
